WHERE DO I START?	THE 12-DOCUMENT TOOLKIT
1 • UNDERSTAND Read #1–2. Be able to explain the Constitutional County idea, its lawful limits, and the Fast Track vs. Long Game strategy in plain language.	1. What Is a Constitutional County? — Start here: mission, structure, principles, and lawful role of local government.
2 • BUILD THE CORE TEAM Use #3. Recruit a small leadership group, assign roles, map county government, and choose one 90-day objective.	2. Constitutional County Strategy Overview — Choose the Fast Track or Long Game and understand the overall campaign sequence.
3 • OPEN RELATIONSHIPS Use #4–5. Meet Commissioners and the Sheriff before asking for major action. Listen, learn concerns, and identify potential allies.	3. How to Organize a County Team — Build leadership, roles, meetings, goals, research, communications, and action systems.
4 • BUILD THE NETWORK Use #12. Launch priority Sphere Teams—faith, business, media, elections, legal, education, cities, legislature, and others relevant to your county.	4. County Commissioner Outreach Guide — Develop Commission relationships, identify sponsors, prepare meetings, and move policy.
5 • CHOOSE THE PATH If support is developing, use #8–10. Start with a Petition or Resolution when needed; advance to the Ordinance when legal review, sponsorship, and public support are ready.	5. Sheriff Outreach Guide — Build a constructive constitutional/public-safety relationship with the Sheriff.
6 • CREATE ACCOUNTABILITY	6. Constitutional Compliance Committee Model — Model an advisory review, referral, education, and accountability structure.

Use #6–7. Establish a lawful advisory complaint/review process only within county authority and without duplicating constitutional-officer powers. 7 • STRENGTHEN ELECTION TRANSPARENCY Use #11. Build a constructive relationship with the Supervisor of Elections; observe, document, verify, and use official procedures. 8 • IMPLEMENT & SUSTAIN After adoption, track implementation, train volunteers, publish progress, expand Sphere Teams, and review the strategy every 90 days.	and disposition. 8. Petition for Redress Template — Turn a documented grievance or policy request into a formal, peaceful request for lawful action. 9. Sample County Resolution — Use as an entry-level measure when the county is not yet ready for a comprehensive ordinance. 10. Model Constitutional County Ordinance — The centerpiece: constitutional review, due process, citizen redress, county-resource decisions, transparency, and implementation. 11. Election Integrity Resources — Citizen assessment, observation, public records, audits, chain of custody, and Supervisor outreach. 12. Sphere of Influence Team Guide — Expand the movement through specialized community teams and measurable 90-day goals.
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THE ACTION SEQUENCE

EDUCATE #1–2 Know the plan	ORGANIZE #3 & #12 Build the team	RELATIONSHIPS #4–5 & #11 Meet key officials	PETITION #7–8 Document & request	ADOPT #9–10 Resolution → Ordinance	SUSTAIN #6 & #12 Accountability & growth
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FIRST 90 DAYS: Weeks 1–2: read #1–3 and form the core team. Weeks 3–4: map officials, spheres, and current issues. Month 2: begin Commissioner, Sheriff, Supervisor, and community outreach using #4, #5, #11, and #12. Month 3: select one measurable objective—education event, petition, resolution, policy review, or ordinance preparation—and use the appropriate Toolkit document.

LEGAL GUARDRAIL: Keep every request tied to powers the county actually possesses. Florida counties have governing authority subject to general and special law, and Florida law prohibits a county from creating or expanding a governmental unit to exercise powers allocated exclusively to specified constitutional officers. Use qualified legal review before introducing an ordinance, creating a committee, or proposing enforcement provisions.
